Pilgrimage to Fatima to Santiago June 9 to June 20, 2025



We had lunch in Nazaré. It was difficult to visit the Church, as there was a wedding in progress.




Nazaré is famous for its traditionally clad women who – at least according to local lore – wear skirts with seven petticoats.



June 16 (Mon). We had Mass in Fatima, departed for Coimbra to see and pray in Sister Lucia's convent (St. Teresa Monastery), visited and prayed in the Cathedral in Braga, and had Mass at Bom Jesus in Braga Parque.



June 17 (Tue). We departed for Pontevedra, Portugal to visit and offer Mass at the former Convent of Lucia. Then we headed to our hotel in Santiago de Compostela.



Our Lady appeared to Sr. Lucia in her cell (this very spot) on December 10, 1925, telling Lucia about the First Five Saturday Devotion. Her cell has been converted into a chapel.



We took our time and prayed from our hearts at Mass here. Afterwards, as usual, we prayed our post-Mass prayer, including the novena to Our Lady of Fatima.




June 18 (Wed.). Our day: two Masses at the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela and a tour of the Cathedral area in between the two Masses.

The Chapel of Relics in the Santiago de Compostela Cathedral houses a variety of relics, most notably the remains of Saint James the Greater, along with those of his disciples, Saint Athanasius and Saint Theodore. The chapel also contains a reliquary bust with the skull of Saint James the Lesser.

June 19 (Thu). Our day: Guided tour of the house of Blessed Alexandrina Maria da Costa in Balasar, Portugal; Mass at her local church; lunch in this little town; head for Porto for the evening.

Because of her paralysis, Blessed Alexandrina was bedridden from April 1925 until her death on October 13, 1955. She lived off the Eucharist the last 13 years and 7 months of her life. Initially, she asked for a miracle healing, but realized after a few years that suffering was her vocation. She said, "Our Lady has given me an even greater grace. First resignation, then complete conformity to the will of God and, finally, the desire to suffer."



Blessed Alexandrina was baptized on April 2, 1904, in the Church of St. Eulalia.



We had Mass at 12:30 p.m. on the Solemnity of Corpus Christi.



Blessed Alexandrina's burial place in the Church. Words written on her tombstone at her request: "Sinners, if the dust of my body can be of help to save you, come close, walk over it, kick it around until it disappears. But never sin again: do not offend Jesus anymore! Sinners, how much I want to tell you.... Do not risk losing Jesus for all eternity, for He is so good. Enough with sin. Love Jesus, love Him!"
